## TITLE: SURGICAL PATHOLOGY, GENERAL POLICIES

## MANUAL: MEDICAL STAFF

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- 1. All specimens removed during a surgical procedure shall be sent to the hospital pathologist for evaluation. Exceptions to sending specimens may be made <u>ONLY</u> when another suitable means of verification of removal has been routinely employed <u>AND</u> when there is an authenticated operative or official report that documents the removal.
- 2. Specimens that by their very nature or condition do not permit fruitful examination may be exempt from the requirement of examination by a pathologist. This includes specimens known to rarely, if ever, show pathological change, and removal of which is highly visible postoperatively, such as the foreskin from the circumcision of a new born infant.
- 3. If **SPECIFICALLY REQUESTED BY THE ATTENDING SURGEON**, the following limited categories of specimens may be exempted as above:
  - a. Cataract
  - b. Surgical hardware
  - c. Foreign body
  - d. Portion of rib removed only to enhance operative exposure
  - e. Therapeutic radioactive sources
  - f. Traumatically injured members that have been amputated and for which examination for either medical or legal reasons is deemed not necessary
  - g. Foreign bodies (for example, bullets) that, for legal reasons, are given directly in the chain of custody to law enforcement representatives
  - h. Foreskin newborn circumcision only
  - i. Teeth provided the anatomic name or anatomic number of each tooth, is recorded in the clinical record
  - j. Normal tissue or scar tissue removed for cosmetic purposes only
  - k. Placentas that are grossly normal and have been removed in the course of uncomplicated operative and nonoperative obstetrics.
- 4. **IN ALL INSTANCES**, the surgical nurse shall send tissues removed during surgery to the hospital pathologist unless specifically listed in the foregoing list.
